Qualifications and Training

A life-love of learning sits at the heart of this profession, and there are certain requirements you need to become a teacher.

The great news is that - depending on what or how you like to learn - there are lots of different routes you can take to get the qualifications you need.

General Certificate of Secondary Education - GCSE

- To become a teacher, you will need a minimum GCSE Grade 4 or above in English and maths
- If you want to teach Primary age pupils, you will also need a minimum Grade 4 in science

A-Level

A-Level grades at relevant pass points to secure your next step into Higher Education.

T-Level

T-Levels are technical qualifications designed by employers for 16-19 year-olds. One T-Level is equivalent to 3 A-Levels.

Vocational Oualifications

Including BTEC, Applied General Qualifications (AGQ) and Vocational Technical Qualifications (VTQ) - all at Level 3.

Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships combine practical training in a job with study.
Intermediate is Level 2,
Advanced is Level 3.

 Early Career Prorgramme - All newly qualified teachers benefit from 2 years of professional development and training alongside a personal mentor during the early years of their career

Pay and Benefits

With a starting salary of £31K, training bursaries for selected subjects and a guarenteed pension - there has never been a more rewarding time to Get into Teaching!



Qualified Teacher £31k to £50K

The starting salary for a Lead Practeacher is £31,650.

Typically, a teacher could be earning £43,607 within 5 years of teaching.

Additional Payments

Teacher also receive additional payments on top of their salary for taking on extra responsibilities like Subject or Department Leaders.

Depending on your role, you could receive up to £16,000 in additional payments.

Lead Practitioner £50k to £76k

Lead Practitioner pay scales are for teachers with exemplary skills who lead the improvement of teaching in their school.

This could include:

- Coaching and mentoring other teachers
- supporting curriculum development
- Leading training and improvement initiatives across your setting

Senior Leadership £50k to £138k

There are a wide range of leadership roles available in schools: Assistant Headteachers, Deputy Headteachers and SENCOs and Headteachers.

Senior Leadership salaries depend on the size, location and phase of the school.

The role of a headteacher is wide ranging, but includes leading teaching, and ensuring that all pupils get a good education.



Other Benefits

• Teacher Pension Scheme

The Teacher Pension Scheme is one of the most generous in the country. Your teacher's pension is the way that you, your employer and the government help you to save for your future. it includes an employer contribution of 28.6%.

• Career Progression

There are many different routes teachers can take as their career progresses - whether it's leading a subject or department, developing curriculum or working with children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).

• Training and Development

A career in education means access to ongoing professional development and training which is often funded by schools, including National Professional Qualifications (NPQs)

Working Across Schools - Multi Academy Trusts

Many schools are now part of a Multi-Academy Trust (MAT) – a group of schools that work together. This means more chances to grow your career: from helping shape the curriculum and leading training, to even becoming a senior leader across schools.

If you're ambitious and ready to make a difference, education offers exciting paths to grow and lead.

Training Routes: School Based Route

School-Based Initial Teacher Training (ITT) is a hands-on way to become a teacher by learning directly in a school setting.





You'll work alongside experienced teachers, gaining real classroom experience while studying teaching methods, lesson planning, and behavior management.

This route helps future teachers build confidence and skills while being fully immersed in school life.

There are 2 main routes: **Teacher Apprenticeship**, **Feepaying** and **Salaried routes**.

Fee-Paying Route

This 11-month course leads to Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) and includes a PGCE. It is unpaid, but some providers offer flexible study options, including full-time or part-time courses (3 or 4 days per week).

Salaried Route

This 11-month course leads to Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) and includes a PGCE. You'll be employed full-time by a school and paid as an unqualified teacher. Both full-time and part-time options (3 or 4 days per week) are available.

Eligibility

- Degree: 2:2 or higher (or equivalent)
- GCSEs: Grade 4 + in English & Maths
- Primary courses require GCSE Grade 4 in Science
- Subject Knowledge: Must match the level you plan to teach
- Relevant A-levels or degree preferred (exceptions considered case-by-case)

- Flexible training options
- School placements nationwide
- Hands-on training with weekly study

- Become a valued team member from day one, bringing fresh skills and ideas



What's next...

After your year of study, you'll qualify as a teacher, ready to lead your own class!

Plus, you'll get two years of support and mentoring as an Early Career Teacher to boost your skills and confidence.

Training Routes: Apprenticeship Route

The apprenticeship route allows you to gain real classroom experience, work towards a degree and QTS, all while earning a wage.



If you're passionate about working with young people and already have some experience in a school—perhaps through volunteering, work experience, or a part-time role—the teaching apprenticeship route could be the perfect next step.

This pathway lets you train on the job while earning a wage, gaining hands-on classroom experience, and working towards a qualified teacher status (QTS) and degree-level qualification, all without the cost of university tuition.

There are 2 types of apprenticeship routes:

- 1. **Postgraduate Teaching Apprenticeship (PGTA):** Ideal route if you are already have a degree and want to be paid a salary to gain qualified teacher status.
- 2. **Teacher Degree Apprenticeship (TDA):** Ideal route if you do not yet have a degree and want to train to teach in a school whilst earning a salary.

Training Routes: University Route

The Bachelor of Education (BEd) Hons - with qualified teacher status degree is the first step towards a career in teaching.





The Bachelor of Education (BEd) Hons is a degree you can take if you want to become a teacher.

When you finish, you get Qualified Teacher Status (QTS), which means you can start working as a teacher. This route is great for students who know they want to teach and want a clear path to get there.

It typically takes **three years** to complete, and includes both **classes at university** and **placement time** teaching in schools.

Year 1 Study

- Introduction to education theory and child development
- Core curriculum subjects (English, Maths, Science) or Focus Subject Training
- Early teaching skills and lesson planning
- First school placement (short duration)

Year 2 Study

- Teaching Pedagogy and Curriculum Development
- Inclusive education & classroom management
- Broader curriculum subjects (e.g., History, PE, Art)
- Second placement with increased teaching time

Year 3 Study

- Advanced teaching methods and educational research
- Major school placement with assessed teaching practice
- Independent project or dissertation on an education topic

Requirements

- GCSEs: Grade 4/C+ in English & Maths
- 3 A Levels or BTEC Triple Grade
- Average UCAS Points Required = 112
- Subject Knowledge: Must match the level you plan to teach

If you love working with children, enjoy being creative, and thrive in a lively, hands-on setting, EYFS teaching is perfect for you!

About EYFS

Teaching young children in the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) is a **fun and rewarding** job. You'll work with children from **birth to age five** in nurseries or schools, helping them learn and grow.

In EYFS, children learn best through play. Teachers create fun activities that spark curiosity and imagination, following the EYFS curriculum.

Playing with others—both indoors and outdoors—helps children develop **physical and social skills** like sharing, taking turns, and managing their emotions.

Essential Skills

- Patience & Understanding:
 Every child develops at their own pace, so teachers must be flexible and compassionate.
- Good Communication: They must communicate well with both children and parents to share information clearly.
- Knowledge of Child
 Development: Understanding how children grow physically, socially, and emotionally helps teachers support their learning effectively.

Training

- Hands-on Training: Gain real experience working with young children.
- **Learn from Experts:** Study child development and teaching strategies with experienced teachers.
- **Placement Support:** A mentor will guide you in planning lessons, observing play, and managing a classroom.
- Career Preparation: Practical experience helps you develop the skills needed for early years teaching.

About Primary

Teaching in a Primary school is an **exciting and vibrant** role, where young children's **curiosity and enthusiasm** make every day unique.

Primary teachers draw on a broad range of subject knowledge and skills, guiding pupils through key stages of learning across the curriculum. The strong bond formed between teacher and pupil creates a nurturing environment where children feel safe, supported, and inspired.

From creative lessons to school events, Primary teaching offers **variety**, **purpose**, and the chance to make a **lasting impact**.

Essential Skills

- 1. Break It Down: Primary teachers turn tricky topics into fun, easy-to-understand ideas using stories, games, and creativity. It's all about making learning click for young minds.
- 2. Mix It Up: Great teachers switch things up—using music, movement, art, and drama to make learning memorable. If you like being creative and thinking on your feet, this is your zone.
- **3. Say Yes to New Stuff:** Being open to new ideas, unexpected questions, and spontaneous moments keeps things fresh—for you and your class.

Primary Roles

- Class Teacher: Lead teaching and learning in your classroom including mentoring trainee teachers on their journey into teaching
- **Subject Leader:** Take responsibility for developing a subject like Maths, Science or Art
- Phase Leader: Lead Phonics across the school, or coordinate areas like Assessment or Enrichment
- Pastoral Leader: Undertake a formal SENCO qualification to support pupils
- Senior Leader: Step into school leadership as an Assistant, Deputy or Head of School

About Secondary

Teaching children and young people with different needs is an **incredibly important** job.

Whilst the expectations of pupil achievement are the same, the **day-to-day life** of a special education teacher will **vary hugely** from that of teachers in mainstream schools.

Unlike more traditional settings, class sizes are often smaller - and teaching ad learning is tailored to meet individual needs.

Expect the unexpected and prepare to learn something new every day!

Essential Skills

- Nurturing Approach: Personcentred and able to nurture and sustain powerful relationships with pupils, families and external colleagues.
- Adaptable and Dependable:
 Being flexible and able to adapt quickly and appropriately is key, while maintaining a calm and constant presence.
- Think out of the Box: Finding creative ways to help overcome challenges and barriers to make learning 'click'.

Support and Training

- Specialist CPD: Access to targeted training in areas like autism spectrum conditions, sensory processing, and communication strategies such as Makaton.
- Collaborative learning and mentoring: Opportunities to learn from experienced colleagues, attend workshops, and participate in peer observations and reflective practice groups.
- Accredited qualifications and courses: Support for pursuing further education such as the NPQ SENCO Award.




